CODE ENFORCEMENT BOARD

Hears cases involving violations of the Town Code and ordinances and imposes administrative fines and other noncriminal penalties where a pending or repeated violation exists. Members must be residents and are appointed by Town Council on the basis of experience or interest in the fields of zoning and building control. The Board includes, whenever possible, an architect, business person, engineer, general contractor, realtor, subcontractor, general member, or person with experience in the field of public health. In addition, the Town Council may appoint two alternate members for the purpose of serving in the absence of any of the board members. Members (and alternate members) shall be appointed for terms of three years. A member of the code enforcement board shall not be appointed for more than two consecutive three-year terms, but shall be eligible for reappointment upon the lapse of nine months after the expiration of the member's second consecutive three-year term.

Application of John B. McGowan, Jr. for service as a Voting Member on The Code Enforcement Board of The Town of Palm Beach Florida

July 27, 2022

- 1.) The Town of Palm Beach enjoys a nationwide reputation for being one of the most beautiful, well-organized, and orderly communities in the United States. The Town's reputation has been achieved through the adoption of a well thought out municipal code of rules and regulations that provide for the quiet enjoyment of all the residents. It is essential that these rules and regulations be followed by all the residents to ensure a peaceful, orderly, and tranquil environment. The Code Enforcement Board (CEB) provides the citizens with a forum to seek a fair hearing to adjudicate any conflicts related to the enforcement of these codes and regulations. During my brief tenure as an Alternate Member of the CEB, I have been dedicated to maintaining this environment in the Town of Palm Beach. I share the mission of the CEB which is to promote, and require, code compliance and ensure a mutually beneficial resolution for the Town and its citizens. It would be my honor to continue supporting this mission as a voting member of the Board.
- 5.) In the 1980's I was the first Chairman of the **Dispute Resolution Board** of our 168-unit condominium community, Mountain View, in suburban Philadelphia. My commitment to the strict enforcement of the condominium documents rules and regulations led to my being elected as the first President of the condominium Board of Directors.
- 11.)Early in my career, I worked as a Staff Assistant to a United States Congressman, in Washington, D.C. and, in this position, was a Case Worker resolving constituent disputes with a variety of Departments and Agencies within the Federal government including the IRS, the Social Security Administration, The Veterans Administration and the Defense Department.

As the Chief Executive Officer of a mid-sized company, for more than 37 years, it was often my responsibility to be the ultimate arbiter in resolving employee conflicts and to enforce all corporate policies, rules, and regulations.

EXHIBIT B

BIOGRAPHY OF JOHN B. MCGOWAN, JR.

Former Chairman & CEO, The Thistle Group, Inc.

John Black McGowan, Jr. was born in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, USA on November 3, 1956. He was graduated from the Great Valley High School, Malvern, Pennsylvania in 1974 and the George Washington University, Washington, D.C. in 1978. He holds a Bachelor of Public Administration (BPA) degree from the Elliott School of International Affairs.

He was associated with the natural gas and fluid process industries for more than 37 years. Mr. McGowan holds several US patents related to safety shut-off gas valve technology known as Excess Flow Valves (EFVs).

Mr. McGowan is the former Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of The Thistle Group, Inc. which was the holding company for Gas Breaker, Incorporated, a family-owned manufacturing concern. The Thistle Group also owned JAECO Fluid Systems, Inc. a manufacturer of pumps and valves used in the fluid process and agricultural irrigation industries.

In 1975, Gas Breaker developed the first commercially successful excess flow valve for use in the natural gas distribution utility industry. Gas Breaker is the dominate manufacturer of excess flow valves in North America with a market penetration of more than 70%.

Mr. McGowan served on several industry Technical Standards Committees for the American National Standards Institute (ANSI), The American Society for Testing Materials (ASTM), The American Gas Association (AGA) and the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME).

Mr. McGowan was the Chairman of the Natural Gas Valve and Fittings Committee (501), of the Manufacturers Standardization Society of the Valve and Fittings Industry (MSS) for 22 years. In 1995, under his leadership, MSS created the first Standard (MSS SP-115) for Natural Gas Excess Flow Valves in the United States, setting the benchmark which has been followed by several other United States standards organizations and was ultimately adopted as the model for a US government regulation that took effect in 2006.

He is the past President of The Society of Gas Lighting in New York City – a group founded in 1875 and composed of gas industry CEO's and Senior Executives involved in the production, pipeline transportation and utility distribution segments of the natural gas industry.

He has received two Distinguished Service Awards from the American Gas Association (AGA) in Washington, D.C. for his contributions to the technical operating committees of the AGA.

In 2015, Mr. McGowan orchestrated the sale of Gas Breaker to the Hubbell Corporation a publicly traded multinational Fortune 500 company.

From 1974 until 1978, Mr. McGowan was employed by the United States House of Representatives in Washington, D.C. as a Staff Assistant and Caseworker to Congressman Richard T. Schulze (retired) of Pennsylvania. In this position he served as the liaison on numerous Department of Defense projects which were being executed in the Congressional District. Mr. McGowan also handled constituent casework which required resolving disputes between government agencies and the public. These issues involved the IRS, Social Security and the Departments of Labor and Justice among others.

In 1985, Mr. McGowan was the first Chairman of the <u>Dispute Resolution Board</u> for the Mountainview Condominium Association in Wayne, Pennsylvania. This Board enforced the rules and regulations related to the operation of the 168-unit condominium complex. He was elected as the first President of the Association in 1986 and served in this capacity until 1987 when he sold the residence and was obligated to resign his position.

In 2005 Mr. McGowan was part of an investor group that raised \$30 million to create Penn Liberty Bank, now part of WSFS Bank, headquartered in Wilmington, Delaware. At the time, this was the largest capitalization raise for any start-up bank in the history of Pennsylvania. The group raised an additional \$14 million the following year. Penn Liberty was sold to WSFS bank in August 2016 for \$101 million realizing a 1.97 times book value ROI for its investors. Biography of John B. McGowan, Jr. Page two

Mr. McGowan was an elected Committeeman in Chester County Pennsylvania where he served for 6 years from 2008 through 2014.

Mr. McGowan served from 2004 to 2014 on the Government Affairs Committee of the Chester County Pennsylvania Chamber of Business and Industry and has also served on the Board of Directors of the organization.

Mr. McGowan is a past President (2007-2009) of the St. Andrews Society of Philadelphia, a Scottish philanthropic society founded in 1747 which provides academic scholarships to US college students to study in Scotland and the United States.

Mr. McGowan served on the Board of Directors of the Community Volunteers in Medicine (CVIM) located in West Chester, Pennsylvania. CVIM is a private health clinic which annually provides more than 7 million dollars of medical and dental services to the working poor in Chester County Pennsylvania.

Mr. McGowan was also active in fundraising for of the Chester County Council, Boy Scouts of America, and the Upper Main Line YMCA.

Mr. McGowan served as a member of the Underground Utility Task Force of The Town of Palm Beach from 2020 to 2022.

Mr. McGowan was appointed to serve as an Alternate Member of the Code Enforcement Board of the Town of Palm Beach in March 2022.

Mr. McGowan is a member of numerous social clubs and organizations in Palm Beach County, Suburban Philadelphia Pennsylvania, Easton, Maryland, and New York City. He enjoys sailing, boating, target shooting, and golf.

Mr. McGowan retired in 2017 and is now a private investor. He, and his wife, Stephanie, reside in the North End of the Town of Palm Beach, Florida.
