Our biggest challenge this year has been replacing volunteer feeders. Many have moved off the Island or stopped helping, due to declining health. The search for new volunteers and feeding stations never stops.

We continue to see our years of hard work foiled by irresponsible off-Island people trapping and dumping cats here. These cats are usually un-neutered and highly trap shy, making them impossible to catch and neuter and leading to concentrated cat population explosions.

Our greatest success was finding homes for 47 kittens that would have had to be returned to the Island if we had not found placement for them. This success was possible only because we put in the required time and effort to domesticate all these feral kittens.

Our humane program is only possible because of the support we receive from our Council, Police, Code Enforcement and residents. We send our heartfelt thanks.
